PURPOSE:

Purpose is for the Legislative Committee to review proposed legislation on Senate Bill 252 (Gonzalez) relating to public retirement systems; fossil fuels; divestment.

BACKGROUND:

As stated in the attached report of bill analysis tiled Senate Rules Committee, Senate Bill 252 (Gonzalez) "prohibits the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) from investing in the 200 largest fossil fuel companies as determined by carbon content in the companies' proven oil, gas, and coal reserves effective January 1, 2024, and requires the systems to divest existing investments in the companies on or before July 1, 2031.

On April 12, 2023, the Senate Labor, Public Employment and Retirement Committee passed the bill and referred it to the Senate Judiciary Committee. On April 18, 2023, the Senate Judiciary Committee passed the bill as amended and referred it to the Committee on Appropriations. The bill was placed on the Suspense File of the Senate Appropriations Committee on May 1, 2023, for consideration of the fiscal impact. The bill was then passed on May 18, 2023, as amended by the Senate Appropriations Committee. On May 25, 2023, it was passed by the Senate. The next step in the legislative process is for the bill to pass the Assembly before being sent to the Governor for consideration.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Legislative Committee review proposed legislation on Senate Bill 252 (Gonzalez) relating to public retirement systems; fossil fuels; divestment and provide direction to staff.

DIGEST: This bill prohibits the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) from investing in the 200 largest fossil fuel companies as determined by carbon content in the companies' proven oil, gas, and coal reserves effective on January 1, 2024, and requires the two systems to divest existing investments in the companies on or before July 1, 2031.

ANALYSIS:

Existing law:

- 1) Provides, pursuant to the California Constitution, that the boards of California's public retirement systems have "plenary authority and fiduciary responsibility for [the] investment of monies and administration of the system." (Cal. Const., art. XVI, § 17)
- 2) Provides under the California Constitution that "the members of the retirement board of a public pension or retirement system shall discharge their duties with respect to the system solely in the interest of, and for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to, participants and their beneficiaries, minimizing employer contributions thereto, and defraying reasonable expenses of administrating the system...[and] the board shall diversify the investments of the system so as to minimize the risk of loss and to maximize the rate of return unless under the circumstances it is clearly not prudent to do so." (Cal. Const., art. XVI, § 17)
- 3) Provides that the Legislature retains its authority to, by statute, "continue to prohibit certain investments by a retirement board where it is in the public interest to do so, and provided that the prohibition satisfies the standards of fiduciary care and loyalty required of a retirement board pursuant to this section." (Cal. Const., art. XVI, § 17)
- 4) Prohibits CalPERS and CalSTRS, under previous legislative mandates, from making or holding certain investments in Iran, Sudan, Turkey, in businesses discriminating against Israel related to the Arab Boycott of Israel, and in thermal coal companies. (Government Code §7513.6 et seq.)

This bill:

- 1) Prohibits CalPERS and CalSTRS from making additional or new investments or renewing existing investments of public employee retirement funds in a fossil fuel company.
- 2) Requires the two retirement boards to liquidate existing investments in a fossil fuel company on or before July 1, 2031.
- 3) Provides that the requirement to liquidate investment in fossil fuel companies may be suspended upon a good faith determination by the board that an act of God, war, or other unforeseeable event creates conditions that materially impact normal market mechanisms for pricing assets and shall only be reinstated upon a subsequent good faith finding of the board that market conditions have

substantially returned to normal ex-ante. Upon such a finding, the board shall have six months to liquidate any remaining investments in a fossil fuel company.

- 4) Defines "Fossil fuel" to mean petroleum oil, natural gas, and thermal coal. Thermal coal is coal used to generate electricity, such as that which is burned to create steam to run turbines. Thermal coal does not mean metallurgical coal or coking coal used to produce steel.
- 5) Defines "Fossil fuel company" to mean one of the 200 largest publicly traded fossil fuel companies, as established by carbon content in the companies' proven oil, gas, and coal reserves.
- 6) Requires each board to report on the status of their fossil fuel investments commencing February 1, 2025, and annually thereafter.
- 7) Exempts each board from taking action unless they determine in good faith that the actions are consistent with their fiduciary duty.
- 8) Indemnifies from the General Fund each retirement board's members and other specified persons from liability associated with claims and losses that may arise due to the bill's provisions.

Related/Prior Legislation

SB 637 (Min, 2023) prohibits a state agency from entering into a contract with, depositing state funds with, or receiving a loan from a financial institution that invests in or makes loans to a company that manufactures firearms or ammunition. The Senate Rules Committee referred this bill to the Senate Governmental Organization Committee and the Senate Banking and Financial Institutions Committee.

SB 1173 (Gonzalez, 2022) was identical to SB 252 (Gonzalez, 2023). The bill died in the Assembly Public Employment and Retirement Committee.

SB 1328 (McGuire 2022) would have banned investments by public pension funds in companies doing business in Russia and Belarus and prohibited state agencies from investing in or contacting with Russian and Belarusian companies. The bill died in the Assembly Public Employment and Retirement Committee.

SB 185 (De León, Chapter 605, Statutes of 2015) prohibited the respective CalPERS and CalSTRS boards from making new or additional investments of

public employee retirement funds in thermal coal companies and requires the boards to engage with thermal coal companies, as specified.

FISCAL EFFECT: Appropriation: No Fiscal Com.: Yes Local: No

According to the Senate Appropriations Committee:

- CalPERS indicates that, as of December 31, 2022, the publicly traded securities in its portfolio that meet the criteria of a "fossil fuel company" as defined in the bill totaled \$9.4 billion. Divesting from these securities and investing in alternatives would result in one-time transactions costs of \$75 million to \$125 million (Public Employees Retirement Fund). CalPERS notes that every dollar that is foregone, or expended on transaction costs and fees, must be offset by employer and employee contributions. Administrative costs would be in the hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to identify the target companies, engage with a consultant, engage outside fiduciary counsel, establish an ongoing tracking and screening process, prepare and transmit associated Legislative reporting, and to ensure oversight and compliance.
- STRS invests in 159 companies with a combined market value of approximately \$5.4 billion that meet the bill's criteria. STRS indicates that it would incur costs of \$31 million (State Teachers Retirement Fund) resulting from transaction costs for liquidating securities, benchmark modification costs, additional costs related to external research services and staff resources for implementation.
- The pension systems may additionally incur opportunity costs if suitable alternative investments are unavailable.

ARGUMENTS IN SUPPORT: According to Fossil Free California, "We have experienced unprecedented and continuing wildfires, droughts, flooding and other extreme weather events. Yet, as the state of California burns, teachers' and public employees' retirement money is still being invested in climate chaos. If carbon emissions aren't drastically cut in the next 10 years, there is virtually no chance of avoiding climate disasters that will lead to mass death and displacement. CalSTRS' and CalPERS' continued investment in fossil fuels is physically and mentally damaging to students, retirees and public employees."

According to a coalition of several non-governmental organizations, "CalSTRS and CalPERS have almost 9 billion invested in fossil fuel producers. A Corporate Knights study found that between 2009 and 2019 if CalPERS and CalSTRS had divested they would have gained \$11.9 and \$\$5.5 billion respectively. During the past seven years, the fossil fuel sector had the highest risk of all sectors, and was

the only sector to lose value. Divestment is entirely consistent with CalSTRS' and CalPERS' missions and fiduciary duties."

According to the California Faculty Association, "SB 252 seizes the moment of the worldwide divestment movement and continues the bold and progressive actions that California must take to address climate change. SB 252 ends the contradictory and incongruous policies that position the state as a leader in the fight against climate change, while simultaneously investing billions in the fossil fuel companies that are causing climate change."

ARGUMENTS IN OPPOSITION: According to the California State Teachers' Retirement System, "CalSTRS is focused on ensuring a secure retirement for California's more than one million working and retired public school educators. Liquidating these investments would reduce the diversification of the portfolio and create deviation from the benchmark, increasing risk and creating potential opportunity costs, which would place the CalSTRS Funding Plan at risk. Any resulting costs would increase the unfunded liability and may also result in an increase in the state's contribution to the Defined Benefit Program."

According to the California Professional Firefighters, "The retirement and security of employees who choose to dedicate themselves to public service should not be determined by broad policies that are not the responsibility of a pension fund. SB 252 threatens the futures of California's public employees, including thousands of firefighters who put their lives on the line every day to protect and serve the public, by prioritizing divestment ahead of the health of the fund."

According to a coalition representing local public agencies and school boards, "In order to improve the funded status of our employees' pension funds, it is critical that CalPERS and CalSTRS have healthy investment returns. Recent market turmoil demonstrates the challenges to achieving those returns – *CalPERS' funded status declined more than 9%, from approximately 81.2% down to 72%, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022.* Divestment makes achieving the returns needed to maintain plan health more challenging."
